



Hello Lisa,

The area in question is remote with limited services from the Riverside County Sheriff's Department. This area is serviced by the Colorado River Station in Blythe. The staffing is limited and based on current community needs. Depending on day of week and time of day, there may be only two deputy sheriff's on duty at one time. Like other calls for service in the Desert Center area, if the temporary workers require law enforcement services, it would impact the level of service that is currently provided to the community in the unincorporated area surrounding Blythe. Depending on the nature of the call type, it could actually eliminate both deputies from the geographic area currently serviced. I realize the workforce is small and for a limited period of time, but the deputies assigned to the Colorado River Station (Blythe) is limited. Do you have any information about similar projects, so we could contact law enforcement in the area ?

Hello Captain Vigue,

I just wanted to let you know that I realized that I had quoted the wrong percentage of construction workers we are assuming as a worst-case scenario temporarily relocate to the area. Based on our analysis of other similar projects in the regional area, such as other solar projects proposed along Interstate 10, we are using 15% of the peak construction workforce as a worst-case scenario as those who could temporarily move into the area. Even assuming the temporary construction residents all live at the workforce camp, the peak number of residents at the workforce camp would be 66 people. Peak construction occurs in month 12 with 438 workers. We are also assuming the 15% workforce for the project's cumulative conditions.

Please let me know if and how the project, given this more specific information, would impact sheriff services, response times, and the department.

Good morning Captain Vigue,

My name is Lisa Worrall and I am working with Kristin Ford on the socioeconomic analysis for the Rice Solar Energy Project and would like to follow up with you on your past email communication with Kristin. I have included the email below. I have been researching your concerns with the workforce camp and have some additional project information which may be something to consider.

According to the Application for Certification (AFC), peak construction is anticipated in the 12th month with approximately 438 construction workers. The AFC estimates approximately 80% of the construction workforce would come from the Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario MSA with the remaining 20% from La Paz County, Arizona.

While the applicant would provide 300 spaces in the workforce camp, we don't anticipate the camp to be fully occupied. Based on year 2016 projections of the annual average total labor by skill type in Riverside and San Bernardino MSA's and the workforce needed for project construction, there would be more than adequate labor within the Riverside and San Bernardino areas for project construction.

For a worst case scenario, if 25% of the project construction workforce temporarily relocated to the workforce camp, the peak number of construction workers at the workforce site in the 12th month would be approximately 110 temporary residents.
